OFFICE OF ALUMNI ENGAGEMENT REPORT

September 2016

In Fiscal Year 2016, the Office of Alumni Engagement produced triple-digit increases in Alumni Society membership dollars; surpassed the goal of signing up 1,000 Pete's Pride volunteers; dramatically increased its social media presence; enhanced Chapter outreach and recruited new Chapter leadership; brought 2,575 guests to campus through various Alumni Engagement events/ activities; and increased the percentage of emailable alumni by 2%. All activities fall in line with one or more of the Alumni Engagement Strategic Plan Cornerstones. A list of highlights appears below.

In FY16, targeted direct mail and email campaigns successfully increased Alumni Society memberships:

- 190% increase in membership dollars from \$28,470 in FY15 to \$82,470 in FY16.
- 29% increase (+657) in net membership numbers from 2,292 in FY15 to 2,949 in FY16.
- 212% increase in the number of new memberships, from 143 in FY15 to 445 in FY16.
- Elevated the membership renewal rate to an impressive 66% in FY16. This represents a 17% increase over the 49% renewal rate in FY15.

Year-long recruitment efforts for Pete's Pride volunteers at both on-campus and community events helped increase the number of Pete's Pride volunteers as well as the volunteer hours worked:

- As of July 19, 2016, Pete's Pride had 1,234 members, surpassing the 1,000-mark by 24%.
- Pete's Pride members surpassed 3,000 cumulative volunteer hours, reaching 3,037.5 hours through July 19.
- The Office of Alumni Engagement will host a Pete's Pride appreciation reception on Thursday, September 15, 2016 from 5:00 to 7:00 p.m. at the McDonough Museum of Art.

Efforts to engage stronger Chapter leadership resulted in new Alumni liaisons in Cleveland, Pittsburgh, Cincinnati, and the New York City/New Jersey Metro Area. The department also implemented data-driven planning through the utilization of YSU's new survey software, *SurveyGizmo*. This enables us to conduct online alumni surveys to effectively collect data to determine the interests and needs of regional alumni and affinity groups, as well as test the feasibility of proposed activities and events.

An expanded focus on digital engagement and social media provided dramatic results, generating 2,948 Facebook followers, up 234 over last year and engaging an average of 2,032 people per week compared to 560 people per week last year. In June 2016 the Office of Alumni Engagement also reestablished its presence on Twitter, and now has 361 Twitter followers.

The year-long *Help us Stay in Touch* campaign –to drive alumni to the website to update their contact information –has produced a 2% increase in the number of emailable alumni addresses, from 33% in FY15 to 35% in FY16. This represents a total of 31,768 who may be reached via email.



Cornerstone 2: Build and Sustain Alumni Engagement

In FY16, the Office of Alumni Engagement coordinated numerous outreach efforts to build and sustain alumni engagement. The combination of direct mail, digital communication, telemarketing and campus and community events and activities resulted in a minimum of 91,000 alumni "touches" nationwide. Following are some highlights of events held since the last Board meeting:

May 21 Tau Kappa Epsilon Red Carnation Ball Reunion

Purpose: Celebrate the 60th Anniversary of the founding of TKE at YSU. The

reunion attracted a group of 170 TKE alumni and partners, making this the largest TKE reunion at YSU and TKE nationwide. In addition to the reunion dinner at the WCBA Atrium, a walking tour of campus was provided earlier in the day. The reunion generated positive feedback and

media coverage; see attached Vindicator article dated May 22.

July 9-10 Summer Festival of the Arts

Purpose: Alumni Engagement shared a tent with the Admissions staff to promote

Alumni Society Membership and Pete's Pride recruitment. Staff members and Pete's Pride volunteers covered all shifts, and attracted over 600 visitors over the two-day period. In addition, Pete's Pride volunteers assisted with event logistics for Summer Festival of the Arts,

Half Century Reunion and Honors College Alumni Gathering.

July 10 Half Century Club Reunion

Purpose: Honor the Class of 1966 and earlier members of the Half Century Club;

provide opportunity to re-connect and reminisce; receive President Tressel's update on current University plans and needs. The champagne brunch was held at the DeBartolo Stadium Club and featured a nostalgic slide presentation and yearbook display. The 75 guests included Lou Zona, featured speaker from the Class of 1966, honored guest Angelina Searles, '66, who is 101 years old, and alumni from as far away as Nevada, Texas and Florida. The gathering generated coverage on two

TV stations.

Cornerstone 3: Develop Working Partnerships with Campus and Community Groups

July 23 LGBT Pride Festival

Purpose: Alumni Engagement helped staff YSU tables to provide information

on upcoming Alumni events, such as the lecture series, the benefits of membership in the Alumni Society, and YSU admissions. It

is estimated that 1,500 individuals attended the one-day event.

YSU event reunites fraternity members, honors TKE anniversary

After having seen the Youngstown State University campus for the first time in nearly 50 years, Ray Talbot struggled briefly to find the words to capture how the experience struck him.

"I'm blown away," the Asheville, N.C., man and 1967 graduate finally said. "The buildings and grounds are so beautiful. I was just astounded, and after today, I'm proud I graduated from Youngstown State University."

Talbot, who also belonged to the university's Tau Kappa Epsilon fraternity, took part in a campus tour, which preceded Saturday evening's Red Carnation Ball reunion in YSU's Williamson College of Business Administration building.

The festive gathering brought together an estimated 166 fraternity alumni members and guests from 18 states to reconnect with friends and become better acquainted with the university's growth and offerings. The event also honored TKE's 60th anniversary on the campus, noted Catherine Cala, YSU's director of alumni engagement.

Attendees, all of whom earned their degrees from the 1960s through the 1990s, also had an opportunity to meet current TKE members, Cala added.

Talbot recalled that tuition during his time at YSU was about \$26 per credit hour. Before graduating, he worked for U.S. Steel Corp., then owned a commercial construction company in Pittsburgh, he said.

"When I began at YSU in 1958, there were three main buildings on campus: the library, a snack bar and the engineering building," recalled John Russ of Montgomery, Ala., who graduated in 1965 and majored in business administration.

Russ, who came with his wife, Sherry, and son Greg, retired after having worked 40 years in the restaurant business. That included having owned three Burger King fast-food eateries in Alabama, he said.

It's probably safe to surmise that if asked, Steve Garasic of Columbiana won't be shy about delving into a passionate discussion about some of the cherished relics he owns from the 1960s.



Those include a vintage 1962 Chevrolet Impala, which sports a 409-horsepower engine and carries a logo that reads, "409," named after the popular Beach Boys song.

Also, Garasic brought to the reunion the original TKE jacket he had bought in 1963. Fifty-three years later, it still fits, said Garasic, who's affectionately known as "Too Tall."

"I'm 5 feet, 18 inches tall," he said with laughter.

Garasic graduated in 1966 and earned his degree in business administration, with minors in psychology and accounting. Now he works in sales for Pittsburgh-based Skyworks Equipment Rental LLC, which sells equipment to the oil and gas industry, Garasic continued.

Also carrying a piece of originality with him was T.R. Rogers of Kitty Hawk, N.C., who brought his original pledge card dated May 14, 1963. Rogers, a 1967 grad, worked for General Motors Corp. and served six years in the Army, including with its Special Security Group.

"It was a really great school, even back then," he said of YSU.

The event also gave Rogers and Talbot a chance to reunite with Bob Shidemantle of Harrisville, Pa. All three pledged TKE together, they remembered fondly.

Many guests enjoyed browsing around a display table on which were yearbooks, framed photographs, an official scroll and numerous other pieces of memorabilia from the 1950s through the '90s.

Cala, the alumni-engagement director, thanked Mike Stephany, planning committee chairman, for working with her organization to make the reunion possible. She also said that many of those who saw the campus for the first time in years were impressed with the ways it has changed over the years.

"Many of the [fraternity] brothers on the tour were amazed by how much YSU has improved," added Cala, who noted that proceeds from the reunion will support four YSU scholarships.

from America Makes to the University of Dayton Research Institute and YSU. It is the largest research grant in YSU's history.

NEA


The National Endowment for the Arts awards YSU a \$100,000 grant to launch a public arts project in Youngstown. The award was among the largest of 64 NEA Our Town grants – out of nearly 250 applicants across the nation.

First PhD

YSU awards a PhD in Material Science and Engineering to Kyle Myers of Sharpsville, Pa. It is YSU's first-ever PhD.

Structurally sound

The YSU Board of Trustees approves a \$169.8 million fiscal year 2017 operating budget that assumes stable enrollment and a 2.2 percent increase in state funding. It is YSU's first operating budget in five years without a structural operating deficit.



Big freeze I and II

YSU freezes tuition and fees at current levels, maintaining the university's status as the most affordable public university in Ohio and Western Pennsylvania. Trustees also freeze room and board rates.

Rankings

YSU programs continue to fare well in national ratings: The online master's degree in Financial Economics ranks fourth nationally by "The Best Master's Degrees"; "Value Colleges" ranks the online master's degree in Criminal Justice as one of the 50 best in the nation; and the master's degree in Student Affairs and College Counseling is listed ninth nationally by "Best Counseling Degrees."





THE OFFICE OF UNIVERSITY EVENTS REPORT

August 2016

A major effort of the Office of University Events is to make our events more engaging to our audiences. We do this visually with our event banners, props and displays which market the university to on and off campus guests. We also do this by analyzing our events and determining how we can make the events more memorable and reflective of the YSU spirit and mission. One such event that we looked at was commencement.

A meeting with the President, Provost, Deans and University Events was held following spring commencement. At this meeting, it was determined that changes need to be put in place to help make the ceremony more engaging for graduates and guests. Changes also need to happen in order to manage the length of the ceremony which is a contributing cause for audience unrest and disruption. Final recommendations were to make the ceremony more personal for the graduates and their families, make it more student-focused and add more pageantry to the experience.

The following are suggestions, approved by the Provost and Deans' Council, to revise our current program:

PRELUDE

ACADEMIC PROCESSIONAL

- Change order of procession to Macebearer, platform party, faculty and then students. This would give the platform party the opportunity to see the full procession
- Faculty could process down the east and west aisles as platform party processes down center aisle

WELCOME

General welcome

COLOR GUARD

• Could come from rear entrance, rather than walking across gym

NATIONAL ANTHEM

STUDENT REFLECTION

- Advise speaker prior that speech should be 3-5 minutes
- President Tressel to continue to introduce with name and degree only

PRESIDENT'S REMARKS

Keep brief

INTRODUCTION OF TRUSTEES

BOARD CHAIR GREETINGS AND REMARKS

Possibly eliminate

INTRODUCTION OF MACEBEARER/SPEAKER

- Eliminate Macebearer certificate presentation.
- Introduction of speaker to only consist of name and title and if alum. Mention the full bio can be found in program book

COMMENCEMENT ADDRESS

• Advise speaker prior that speech should be 3-5 minutes

MUSICAL SELECTION

• Possibly alter/eliminate

PROVOST REMARKS AND PRESENTATION OF CANDIDATES FOR DEGREES

- Eliminate remarks. Student highlights could be displayed on video board/lobby TVs prior to ceremony. Marketing and communications can put together a professional video
- Eliminate recognition of honors students—they are recognized as honor recipients when they get their diplomas
- Introduce deans and then straight to introduction of conferral of degrees

CONFERRING OF DEGREES

• No hooding of Masters candidates; Doctoral only

PRESENTATION OF HONORARY DEGREE

 Move to immediately follow the speaker's address so that the speaker doesn't have to get up and down a second time

PRESENTATION OF CANDIDATES FOR DEGREES ROTC COMMISSIONING CEREMONY

- Only in spring, afternoon ceremony
- Move up in ceremony, possibly before degrees given
- Move to center of stage instead of stage left

CLOSING REMARKS

• Eliminate the "seal" remarks. It is described in the program book

Other suggested changes to enhance the ceremony include:

- Position the camera to focus in on students as they shake their dean's hand when getting diplomas and simultaneously display on the video board
- Initiate student marshals and detail way to define and select them. They need to be well trained—carry gonfalons, help with student line up/distribution of reader cards, carry gonfalon to lead colleges to get their diplomas. Make banner procession more elaborate
- Have the President move to the end of the ramp to congratulate students. This will alleviate some congestion
- YSU police are networking with other universities to see what can help with audience disruption
- Dean Paul has some ideas about switching up the music—prolonging procession/recession, perhaps have a violinist on stage while students are getting diplomas. Could also be a quartet, or some other small ensemble

Spring 2017 will mark the 95th anniversary of commencement being celebrated at YSU. This would be a good time to fully unveil changes and updates to the ceremony. Fall 2016 could serve as a trial run for the changes and give us time to work out any kinks before the full Spring production. Final approval of these proposed changes is needed by the events committee of the academic senate at their first meeting of the fall semester.
